1. New Winter 2015 Course: GDB 101

- Global Disease Biology (GDB) 101: Epidemiology.
- The CRN for this course is 94619. This is a 4 unit course and includes a lab.
- Lectures will be Tuesdays and Thursdays from 12:10-1:30 pm, and Lab will be Fridays from 2:10-5:00pm. The instructor is Dr. Neil McRoberts.
- Prerequisites for this course include SAS 13, BIS 2A-2C, and a STA course: 13, 100, or PLS 120.
- This course introduces concepts and methods used in the study of disease dynamics in human, animal, and
 plant populations. The course focuses on principles, but given the subject matter it makes extensive use of
 quantitative methods. Topics include causes of disease, measures of disease intensity, diagnosis and
 decision making, analysis of disease intensity in space and time, and predictive modeling of disease.

4. Student Contest Coordinators Needed for Ag Sciences Field Day!

- The College of Agriculture and Environmental Sciences is looking for current undergraduate students who
 are organized and detail oriented to help coordinate contests for the Annual CA&ES Field Day on March 7,
 2015! On Field Day, approximately 3,000 high school students come to UC Davis to compete in the 24
 different contests on a variety of topics.
- Coordinators are needed for the Ag Sales, Nursery/Landscape, and Farm Business Management contests.
 Past experience is not required, and you can earn units along with many other practical skills. Below is a
 short description of each contest, but the attached guidelines outline each contest in more detail. Each
 contest has a staff or faculty advisor who is a resource for the student and provides insight on the contest
 from past experiences, and will aid them in properly coordinating and executing a successful contest.
- <u>Agricultural Sales:</u> The sales and marketing of agricultural products is a key to profitability in today's competitive economy and agricultural sales play a major role in the marketing process. Through this contest, students will have the opportunity to prepare for careers in sales by participating in a range of activities oriented around the total sales process.
- <u>Farm Business Management:</u> Contest shall be based on the depreciation section of the adopted Farm Account Book, the John Deere Farm and Ranch Business Management Book, and the Farmer's Tax Guide. This contest consists of three sections: Cash Flow Budget Problem, Written Test on Record Business Management, Written test on Tax Management.
- <u>Nursery Landscape</u>: Students judge classes of plants, take tool and plant identification tests, tests on general Ornamental Horticulture knowledge, and complete a transplanting practicum.

2. Student Assistant Position: UC Davis Livestock Air Quality Program

- This Student Assistant position entails participating in research studies for the Department of Animal Science
 Air Quality Mitloehner Laboratory. The research studies are centered on management and feeding
 strategies to mitigate emissions from livestock production systems.
- Responsibilities and duties in this position include handling and feeding cattle during research trials, administering any necessary medications, assisting veterinarians in medical procedures, running cattle through a chute, and assisting in milking processes. Note that with feeding, shifts may start anywhere from 4:30-6:00am, daily.
- Large animal experience and experience operating farm machinery is preferred, but not required for this
 position. Minimum time commitment is 15 hours per week. The ability to work on weekends or holidays is
 preferred.

3. Winter 2015: Science, Environmental, and Health Education Internships!

- In these internships, you can gain career and job skills, inspire youth and community members, and have fun! These internships are a two quarter commitment.
- Students participate in a weekly Friday seminar to learn science outreach methods and how to engage different audiences. Students will apply this in an outreach section can help design curriculum, visit schools or outdoor sites, pilot activities, and assess learning.
- Students registered for the internship receive two units of academic credit and must attend BOTH the Friday 1:10 - 3:00 pm seminar AND an outreach section. Weekly section meetings and outreach visits will be determined by participant schedules. For off-site outreach visits, travel is by carpool. All majors are welcome.
- There are seven sections offered for these internships:
 - Adventures in Science: Design and present interactive science lessons for local junior and senior high school students. Lesson plans can include environmental, physical, biological, health, and social sciences. If you are interested in this section, please contact Seojung at sikang@ucdavis.edu.
 - <u>Watch It Don't Squash It (WIDSI):</u> Get kindergarten through 5th grade students excited about science! Design and present interactive activities in local elementary schools to teach children the importance of the science behind an environmental topic of your choice.  - Stebbins Nature Outings: Learn to design and lead engaging nature outings for youth, families, and the general public. Topics include ecological adaptation and diversity, water conservation, geology and watersheds, plants and animals. 3. U.S. Department of Homeland Security: Summer 2015 STEM Internships

- The U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) sponsors a 10-week summer internship program for undergraduate and graduate students majoring in homeland security related science, technology, engineering and mathematics (HS-STEM) disciplines. The program provides students with quality research experience at federal research facilities located across the country, and allows students the opportunity to establish connections with DHS professionals. It is open to students in a broad spectrum of HS-STEM disciplines and DHS mission-relevant research areas.
- Undergraduate students in the program will receive a \$6,000 stipend plus travel expenses.
- The 10 week research experiences are offered in the following locations: Argonne, Berkeley, Livermore, Los Alamos, Oak Ridge, Pacific Northwest, and Sandia National Laboratories; as well as at Homeland Security Studies and Analysis Institute, Coast Guard Research and Development Center, Customs and Borders Protection Laboratories and Scientific Services, Domestic Nuclear Detection Office, Federal Emergency Management Agency, Naval Research Laboratory, Engineer Research and Development Center, National Security Technologies Remote Sensing Laboratory, Transportation Security Laboratory, and more.
- Areas of research include Engineering, computer science, mathematics, physics, chemistry, biological or life sciences, environmental science, emergency and incident management, social sciences, and more.
- U.S. citizenship required for these internships, and the application deadline is **December 22**, **2014**.
