4. We've Updated our Flyers and Handouts!

- We've recently updated many of our flyers and handouts in the Advising Center! We now have updated information on appropriate GE courses, studying abroad, minoring, and more. Stop by the Advising Center in 1202 Meyer Hall to pick up a copy of any of our flyers for yourself or your friends!
- <u>Common GE Courses Handout</u>: We are often asked which GE courses are most useful for our major, or which GE courses work best to satisfy the requirements not covered by our major. While the truth is that you can take any GE course that satisfies the specific requirement you need, we have compiled a list of common GE courses that many of us and your fellow students have taken and recommended, to help you find a course that suits you.
- <u>Study Abroad Handout</u>: This new handout outlines the differences between UCEAP and the Summer Abroad Programs, and provides a list of some of the international universities with coursework relevant to animal science majors.
- <u>Minoring in Animal Science Handout:</u> If you're considering switching to another major, but are still interested in minoring in Animal Science as an alternative, you can pick up a Minors handout! This handout provides more general information on the Animal Science minors offered, and the requirements and stipulations necessary to declare a minor. PLEASE NOTE: You CANNOT major in Animal Science and declare an Animal Science minor simultaneously, there is too much overlap in the coursework. You must be in a different major entirely to declare an Animal Science minor.

- <u>Updates to the ANS, ANM, and AEE Checklists:</u> We have changed the format of the GE requirements sheet in each of our major requirement checklists so that it's easier to read and the major information is pre-filled. The format of our new GE Sheet is entirely different from the GE requirement handout produced by the Dean's office, but the same general information is on either form. This new GE requirement sheet is exclusively produced by our Advising Center. If there is any confusion about the new format, please let us know so we can improve the form.

4. Animal Care Job Available through the Psychology Department

- This job entails caring for colonies of rats, mice, prairie voles, and opossums. Students will provide unsupervised maintenance of the animal colonies, which includes health checks, monitoring temperatures, changing cages, restocking and maintaining equipment, and cleaning the facility. Students may assist with administration of medications.
- Students must be comfortable working with the species above, and be able to lift at least 50 pounds. Students must be able to work some weekends, holidays, summers, and throughout the school year, and be available in the event of an emergency or disaster.
- Work is scheduled to accommodate classes, but flexibility is required because hours are variable. A resume and cover letter will be required when applying.
- This position pays \$9.00 per hour.
