1. Academic Peer Adviser Job Opening!

- The Animal Science Advising Center is looking for an academic peer adviser for the 2015-2016 academic year. If you are interested in advising students in Animal Science, Animal Science and Management, and Agricultural and Environmental Education, and contributing to the success of the Animal Science Department, please consider applying for the position.
- Peer advisers will work up to 10 hours per week and this is a paid position.
- Applicants for this position must be available for all three quarters Fall 2015, Winter 2016, and Spring 2016. If hired, you will also be required to participate in the new Peer Adviser training course offered this Spring 2015: EDU 160, 4 units Pass/No Pass, at 8:00-9:50am Mondays and Wednesdays in Scrub Oak Auditorium.

3. Important Dates for Winter 2015

- As we continue this quarter, it's important to keep certain important dates in mind:
- Monday, February 9th: 25th Day of Instruction
 - Last day to opt for P/NP grading. Please note that you CANNOT opt any major courses P/NP, all major requirements must be taken for a grade.

4. Changes to ANS 136A and 136B!

- ANS 136A and 136B are no longer being offered! They have been separated into two completely independent courses, ANS 136: Techniques and Practices of Fish Culture, and ANS 137: Techniques and Practices of Avian Culture. From now on, ANS 136 will be offered in Fall and ANS 137 will be offered in Spring. Either of these classes will meet laboratory requirements for ANS majors.
- If you have already taken 136A, please contact Dr. Hung at <u>sshung@ucdavis.edu</u> about completing the ANS 136 series. You will need to enroll in a separate ANS 198 course in order to complete the requirement.
 PLEASE NOTE: You do not need to worry about contacting Dr. Hung if you have never taken 136A or 136B. The ANS 198 course exception ONLY applies to students who only completed half of the original series.

5. New ANS Spring Course Updates!

- We've created a few new courses in the Animal Science Department! These courses are designed to help students define their career paths, offer more relevant coursework to Animal Science majors, and provide units toward specialization. These courses will not appear in Schedule Builder or the Class Search Tool, you must type in the CRN directly to find them.
- NOTE: When searching these courses on Schedule Builder, it may have a warning stating that you need consent of the instructor to take the course. Do not worry about this warning; it is there because the courses are brand new and still listed as ANS 98/198. You can register for these courses without needing consent of the instructor, as long as you have the CRN.
- ANS 98-033 (will later become ANS 30): Topics and Careers in Animal Science (2 units)
 - o This course is for sophomores looking for more career options within Animal Science. It will be taught by Dana Van Liew, and will be held Wednesdays from 1:10-5:00pm.
 - o Enrollment cap is currently at 20 students; **sophomores will be given first priority**.
 - o This is currently scheduled as a variable unit course. After officially adding to the course, <u>you will need</u> to manually change the course units to 2 (via Schedule Builder). This course is Pass/No Pass.
 - o CRN: TBA

• ANS 198-033 (will later become ANS 100): Animal Physiology (5 units)

- o This course provides a more relevant alternative to the NPB 101 major requirement, and is accepted by vet schools for their physiology requirement. It will be taught by Dr. Todgham and will be held Monday through Friday from 10:00-10:50am.
- o Enrollment cap is currently at 100 students, but the course is Pass 1 restricted to Animal Science majors.
- o This course is NOT open for credit to any student who has completed NPB 101 with a grade of D- or better
- o This is currently scheduled as a variable unit course. After officially adding to the course, <u>you will need</u> to manually change the course units to 5 (via Schedule Builder).
- o CRN: 21539
- ANS 198-044 (will later become ANS 150): Animal Health and Disease (4 units)

- This course may be used towards specialization units! It is taught by Dr. Zhou and will be held Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9:00-10:20am, and Wednesdays from 12:10-1:00pm. There may be alternative discussion times available.
- o This is currently scheduled as a variable unit course. After officially adding to the course, <u>you will need to manually change the course units to 4</u> (via Schedule Builder).
- o CRN: 21550

6. New Hybrid Course! VMB 101Y

- VMB 101Y, Principles of Pharmacology and Toxicology, is a hybrid 3 unit course taught by Professor Birgit Puschner. The CRN for this course is **52034**.
- The course will be held on **Thursdays from 2:10-3:50**, and there will be an information session for the Class on **March 30th from 1-2pm**. The class and the information session will both be held in VM3B 1105.
- The hybrid course structure includes self-directed learning, online collaboration, and face-to-face learning.
- The course provides training in core concepts of pharmacological and toxicological sciences, and prepares students to develop higher-order problem solving skills.
- The course is specifically designed for advanced undergraduate students with interests in pursuing graduate degrees in pharmacology and toxicology, or professional degrees including DVM, MD, pharmacy, dentistry, or nursing.
- This course can be used for most ANS specializations with faculty adviser approval.

C. Scholarships

1. NPFDA Scholarships Available

- The NPFDA (National Poultry and Food Distributors Association) Scholarship Foundation is entering its 36th year in scholarship assistance. They will awards four \$2,000 scholarships to students in the fields of poultry science, food science, agricultural economics/marketing, and all other fields of study related to the poultry industry.
- Students must be in their sophomore or junior year to apply. Applicants must be enrolled as a full time student.
- To apply, please complete the attached application and write a 1-2 page letter detailing your career goals.
 The application, goals, transcripts, and an endorsement of the student must be forwarded to the NPFDA Scholarship Foundation by either the student or the department head.
- The application, transcript, and letter of endorsement must reach the NPFDA office no later than **May 31**st, **2015**. Selection and notification will be completed by July 15th.

2. San Diego County Farm Bureau Scholarships

- The San Diego County Farm Bureau is offering scholarships for students who are permanent residents of San Diego County and pursuing a course of study in agriculture or a closely related field.
- A recommendation from a teacher or academic advisor is required, in addition to a recommendation from a current or former employer. Transcripts must also be included with the application (photocopies are acceptable).

- Scholarship awards in the past have ranged from \$500-\$5,000. Completed applications must be postmarked or emailed by March 30th, 2015.

3. California Woolgrower's Association Scholarship

- The California Woolgrower's Association Scholarship is set up to provide financial assistance to enrolled students in academic programs related to the California Sheep Industry. This support may be used to offset normal academic fees or to help offset costs of senior projects and/or research efforts.
- Students must have completed at least one year of studies in an Agricultural major, and have a minimum 3.0 GPA. The award amount is \$500.
- The application requires an essay, summary of career plans, and 3 current letters of recommendation, along with verification of enrollment.
- Applications are due by **June 1**st, **2015**. An application has been attached to this email.
