There are plenty of ways to get exotics experience in the local area:

UC Davis California Raptor Center:

Located just south of the UC Davis campus along Old Davis Road, the CRC works tirelessly to rehabilitate and save the lives of California's native birds of prey. Volunteer applications are available at the beginning of the quarter, upon request.

Meyer Hall Hatchery:

The hatchery on the lower level of Meyer Hall houses tropical bird species used in research. Students have an opportunity to work at the hatchery in ANS 49K (2 units), or an independent internship.


Wild Campus:

Wild Lands Studies:

Spend a quarter immersed in wildlife research, in the US or abroad. Small teams of students work alongside professional biologists in their area of interest. Trips may count for 6 to 18 quarter units of credit. **Visit: www.wildlandsstudies.com**

African Conservation Experience:
