A. Announcements / Upcoming Events

1. Important Information for Students Needing ANS 2:

- If you are one of the many students unable to get into Animal Science 2, here is some important information for you!
- If you haven't done so already, please waitlist for ANS 2! We cannot help you if you are not on a waitlist.
- There will be extra lab sections opening for the class on Monday and Friday afternoons. The extra Monday lab will be held from 3:00-6:00 pm, and the extra Friday labs will be held from 12:00-3:00 and 3:00-6:00.
- You will not be able to register for these extra sections on your own. The sections will remain closed and we will administratively add students into these sections from the waitlist. This will ensure that students with the most need are added first. Students with the highest priority for ANS 2 include freshmen, transfers, and students who have recently changed into our majors.
- If you need to get into ANS 2, please try to leave these extra lab times open in your schedule, as we will likely move students off the waitlist into these sections first before adding any spots to current lab sections.
- In addition to the extra lab sections, there will also be an additional lecture session in order to accommodate all students into the class. The new lecture section will be offered in the mornings, and *may* be at the same time as the current lecture section, depending on room availability.
- Remember: You MUST be on a waitlist in order for us to add you to the course. You do not need to waitlist for a specific section, any section will work. You may waitlist during your Pass 2 appointment, or during open hours following your Pass 2 appointment. Open hours are from 10pm-6am on weekdays and 10am-6pm on weekends, up until the registration freeze.

2. V.O.I.C.E. and Mentoring Programs for Undergraduates:

- Veterinary Students as One in Culture and Ethnicity (V.O.I.C.E.) is a national, student-run organization focused on enhancing socio-cultural awareness, diversity, and inclusiveness in the veterinary field.
- The UC Davis chapter was established two years ago and has since been working to become an avenue for underrepresented pre-veterinary student populations to receive encouragement, support, and mentorship from current veterinary students. UCD SVM's V.O.I.C.E. chapter has since developed mentor-mentee programs, providing undergraduate students one-on-one opportunities to interact with current veterinary students, hosted informational talks on preparing for veterinary school and overcoming socio-cultural and economical obstacles, and attended outreach events to encourage underrepresented communities to consider careers in veterinary medicine.
- V.O.I.C.E. hopes to establish closer connections with underrepresented students on the UC Davis campus, and to offer personalized mentorship to students who feel culturally, socially, or economically underrepresented in the veterinary community.

5. Wildlands Studies Summer Programs

- Wildlands Studies has some amazing summer programs available! See below:
 - o Southeastern South Africa: Students transect bottle nose dolphins and grey whales.
 - o Three Fijian Islands: Study island biogeography and marine ecology
 - Belize: Explore mangroves, an inland river passage with howler monkeys, tropical forests and multiple Mayan Ruins.
 - o There are also two week courses available which include studying wolves in Yellowstone, wildlife corridors in Banff, migrating grey and humpback whales Vancouver Island, the native and reestablished Santa Cruz Island fox on the California Channel Islands, sea otters and steelhead in California's Big Sur, and returning whale sharks in Baja, Mexico.
- All programs are intensive academic field studies where students learn on-site about research, field methods, and environmental sustainability.
- All summer programs still have space available, including the most popular programs in Belize and Yellowstone.

- Animal Science majors can also receive specialization credit at their faculty adviser's discretion.

2. Science Education and Activism Interns

- The National Center for Science Education is seeking summer interns to work on science education activism, with a particular focus on climate change education. These are temporary positions based in Oakland, CA.
- The National Center for Science Education (NCSE) is a non-profit organization that defends and promotes
 the teaching of science in public schools. They provide information, resources, and support related to areas
 of science that are often attacked on social or political grounds, such as climate change, evolution, the Big
 Bang, and genetically modified foods. Our mission is to ensure that these topics are presented in a
 scientific, engaging, and accurate manner in the classroom.
- NCSE is looking for two interns (one full-time and one part-time) for three months from June-August 2015, to help with NCSE's launch of a new teacher engagement campaign to support and defend educators as they teach these topics, with a particular focus on climate change education. This is a unique opportunity for someone with a science background to learn about science advocacy to support one of the most important groups: science teachers.

- The selected candidate will receive training in:
 - Climate change science and education
 - o Common denial arguments and tactics
 - o Writing for a public and educational audience
 - o Developing a large scale, national campaign to engage educators
 - o Using social media and web technologies to connect with educators
- Students in these positions must have a basic understanding of and interest in science, science education, and science advocacy. Good writing and computing skills are required, and timeliness and follow-through are a must. This is an ideal position for a current undergraduate or recent graduate, but the NCSE will review all applicants equally.
- These are paid positions, with the full-time position requiring 40 hours a week and the part-time position requiring 16 hours a week. The internship mentor will meet with each intern on a weekly basis, and be present while the interns are working. Due to the short nature of the internship, there will not be an opportunity for the intern to take a vacation during this time, though we do have July 4 off. The full-time position pays \$6,000 for the summer; the part-time position pays \$2,000.
