Background:

The United States Agency for International Development (USAID) is the world's premier international development agency and a catalytic actor driving development results. The Agency is committed to using data and evidence to accelerate innovative approaches in development and to transform development outcomes, and understands that opening data and sharing it widely can lead to new breakthroughs in support of the Agency's mission.

In October 2014, <u>USAID announced</u> the release of its first ever Development Data Policy (ADS Chapter 579). This policy established the <u>Development Data Library (DDL</u>) as the Agency's central digital repository for USAID-funded, machine readable data. It also directed Agency staff and implementing partners to register or submit USAID-funded data to the repository. The DDL serves as USAID's source for advancing the availability and access to rich, heterogenous microdata. Most importantly, it facilitates reuse of data for the next generation of development work.

In 2018, USAID plans to launch a new, improved DDL platform that will catalyze the availability, access, and use of USAID data. The new DDL will offer a redesigned data submission process with improved navigation, enhanced organization for data holdings, and expanded features to accelerate data use, such as in-platform visualizations.



Position Description:

USAID Data Science and Curation Interns will be a part of USAID's data community working to advance the availability, accessibility, and re-use of development data. Interns will provide support related to managing data at multiple points throughout the information lifecycle. This includes supporting business processes related to identifying, reformatting, redacting, submitting, tagging, approving, publishing, and archiving datasets generated with USAID funding. The intern will provide analytical products and services using foreign assistance data and information resources, which may require running queries on databases, enterprise systems, and other primary data sources.

Each intern will, at minimum, support the launch of USAID's new Development Data Library (DDL), to include:

- a) Learning and apply best practices for preserving, manipulating, and transforming data to migrate complex datasets into the new DDL;
- b) Enhancing dataset metadata and documentation to improve the usability of datasets through the DDL;
- c) Learning and applying best practices for data publication and sharing to help advance the responsible release of datasets through the DDL;
- d) Developing training materials for USAID staff, partners, and public users who are new to the platform.

Awards

Scholarship Program Objectives

The purpose of the program is to develop and design the logo and associated style guide for the US SWEET POTATO COUNCIL.

The US SWEET POTATO COUNCIL is an advocate for the economic well-being of the US Sweet Potato producer. The sweet potato producers and the entire US sweet potato industry benefit directly and indirectly from the activities of the Council that supports them in implementing reasonably priced promotion activities, monitoring federal issue affecting the growers' ability to produce efficiently, advocating key congressional representatives and staff on federal issues important to growers, and providing a forum for bringing together, on a national level, growers and issues of diverse regions.

Eligibility Requirements

Application procedures for students

- 3. Write a statement of your design rationale.

- 1. If an awardee withdraws from school, the unused balance of the award must be returned to the US SWEET POTATO COUNCIL.
- 2. Scholarship recipient is asked, if possible, to attend the US SWEET POTATO COUNCIL Convention.

Selection Process

- 1. A US SWEET POTATO COUNCIL scholarship will be awarded to a student attending one of the listed universities Auburn University, Louisiana State University, Mississippi State University, North Carolina State University and University of California.
- 2. The award of these Scholarships will be based on the following:
 - a) Design
 - b) Style Guide
 - c) Statement your rationale for the design submitted.
 - d) Financial needs will not be a consideration for this award.
- 3. The Scholarship Committee will select the recipient(s).

Selection Submissions:

- a) Design 60%
- b) Clarity of expression, spelling and grammar 20%
- c) Persuasiveness 10%
- d) Originality of thought 10%

The evaluation will be according to the personal opinion of the council's panel of judges.

Notification

The awarded applicant and the University will be notified of the recipient. A written acceptance from the successful recipient must be sent to the US SWEET POTATO COUNCIL office before the scholarship funds will be released for use by the recipient.

The 39th Year of the NPFDA Scholarship

The National Poultry and Food Distributors Association Scholarship Foundation has given almost \$240,000.00 to rising leaders in the 39 years it has been operating. Every year since 1979, NPFDA has awarded a select group of deserving students with a scholarship to help them complete their poultry or agriculture related degrees.

In the Past:

The NPFDA scholarship began when its leadership saw the need for outstanding "People Resources" in the agricultural industry. In 1986, the William Manson

Family Memorial Scholarship and the Alfred Schwartz Memorial Scholarship Awards were established. In 1997, NPFDA named a third scholarship award the Albin S. Johnson Memorial Scholarship Award.

The yearly award has increased to \$4000 per student and the number of students to be awarded has increased to 5 (\$20,000 total in awards). The NPFDA scholarship committee chooses five exceptional students each year. Two students will be chosen from NPFDA Member Companies (employees or children of employees

The funds for the 2018-2019 scholarships come from private cash donations and donations to NPFDA's annual silent auction. The silent auction is held each January during the Annual Convention in Atlanta at the Awards reception.
