

The Livingston Ripley Waterfowl Conservancy (LRWC) is accepting applications for an avian care and environmental education internship for undergraduates, recent graduates and graduate students in the fields of science or biology.

Interns receive on-the-job training alongside our internationally known staff in all aspects of aviculture working with the Conservancy's large captive collection of waterfowl comprised of approximately 450 birds representing over 70 species from all over the world including cranes, pheasants, raptors and wading birds.

In addition interns will have the opportunity to participate in the Conservancy's environmental education programs under the supervision of the Educator during LRWC's summer camp and adult education programs.

Position Description:

This internship begins in July 2018. The duration of the internship is six (6) months. Interns are provided with housing and a monthly stipend.

Internship responsibilities include:

- · Feeding, maintenance, and care of the captive waterfowl collection
- · Cleaning enclosures and ponds
- Aviary maintenance including grounds and structures
- · Assistance with bird capture
- · Exposure to raptor care and training
- Record keeping
- · Interacting with LRWC visitors and donors during public visitation (the Conservancy is open to the public May 5th through November 30th) hours and special events
- · Training and working with imprinted education birds
- · Assisting our Educators at school, community events, distance learning and onsite programs including the three week summer camp
- Support fundraising initiatives including mailings and general event preparations
- · Experience with Facebook, Instagram, Twitter
- · Proficiency with MS Word, Excel and Publisher

This is a demanding position that requires long hours and extended periods outside in adverse weather conditions. Applicants must be willing to put in the time and effort to complete projects as needed.

Qualifications:

- · Undergraduate or graduate students in the field of science or biology
- · Students in related fields may also be considered
- · Experience in animal care and/or experience with avian care is highly desirable
- · Exceptional attention to detail
- Capable of performing diverse tasks simultaneously
- · Ability to problem solve in the field
- High level of professionalism
- · Effective interpersonal skills and a cordial attitude
- · Be able to lift at least 50 pounds, climb a ladder 20 feet or higher and perform overhead work
- · Able to operate maintenance equipment such as riding mowers, weed whackers and basic power tools

Applicants must also be available to work any of the seven days of the week and holidays with the possibility of late evenings as needed. Days off will vary from week to week. A valid driver license is required.

Compensation: Interns receive housing and a bi-weekly stipend of \$200.00 (\$400.00 per month).

About the Conservancy: The Livingston Ripley Waterfowl Conservancy is a not for-profit organization dedicated to the conservation of waterfowl and wetland habitats through research, education, and conservation action. An integral part of our conservation and education programs are the aviaries, where over sixty species of waterfowl, as well as cranes, screamers and raptors, are housed. Conservancy staff conducts on-site and offsite environmental education programs relating to biodiversity andwaterfowl and wetland conservation, often utilizing the aviaries and imprinted education birds.

LRWC is located in Litchfield, a small town with 8,000 residents in northwest Connecticut. Applicants should be aware of the opportunities and limitations of living in a quaint New England community. A car is highly recommended. Interns cannot drive Conservancy vehicles. Litchfield is an outdoor enthusiast's paradise and LRWC itself has access to several hundred acres of wetland and upland habitats.

To Apply: Qualified applicants should email a cover letter, resume, and at least three references in one document to Andrew Ocampo, Director of Aviculture at aocampo@Irwc.net. Resumes will be reviewed as they are received, with application deadline of May 31st. No calls please. Interns must submit to a background check, provide proof of health insurance and have had a medical physical within the last three years.

Judging:

Reviewer's choice awards (1st, 2nd and 3rd Place awards, up to \$500): Winners will be judged on academic and/or scientific merit, quality of the content/message, and creativity used in the production and narration of the video. A panel of reviewers will help choose the winners (first place award = \$500, second place award = \$300 and third place award = \$200). Reviewers include UC Davis faculty, members of CapSciComm, and Exploratorium Program Directors.

Popular choice award (\$300): Involve your friends and family! The video with the highest number of popular/audience votes (i.e. views) will win the popular choice award (\$300).

Eligibility

All applicants must currently be *pursuing undergraduate research* and fit the following criteria:

- Undergraduate student at UC Davis; any year, any discipline (currently enrolled or graduated in the 2017-18 academic year)
- Research performed under the guidance of a UC Davis faculty sponsor in any area.

Research Rockstars Video Contest Requirements

- Make a 3-minute YouTube video featuring and explaining your research appropriate for a wider audience. Your video cannot be longer than 3 minutes!
- **Upload video on YouTube** so it is publically viewable. If you don't clicked **Publish**, your video won't be viewable by other people. Include a title (up to 100 characters) and description (up to 5000 characters) when you upload your video on YouTube.
- Along with your video, <u>submit</u> a 200-word description of the project and/or experimental method as
 well as the larger context of the project. This description should also be appropriate for a wider
 audience. Please try to avoid discipline-specific jargon in your description.
- The student entering the contest must conceptualize, direct, and narrate; editing and technical assistance is allowed.
- The video should include some glimpses featuring the student performing their research.
- The video should include an audio narration outlining the background and description. Overall creativity is encouraged in the communication style.
- Once uploaded on YouTube, the link and 200-word description should be submitted in the application form here. (https://form.jotform.com/81214601779154)
- If you show research in a lab, you **MUST be wearing proper PPE** and have permission of the lab PI. If you don't, UC Davis websites cannot post it.
- If you use music in your video, you **MUST use royalty-free music!** If you don't, your video will be booted from YouTube and UC Davis websites cannot post it.
- Take ownership of your research, but make sure to give proper acknowledgements to facilities,
 faculty, staff, lab-mates, friends and family that are in your video or involved with your research,
 when appropriate.
- Make sure to include that your research was performed at UC Davis. You are also encouraged to include your name and major.
- If you wish to participate in the contest as a **group of undergraduate students** from a research team/lab, you are most welcome to do so. However, there should be only one leading researcher who should conceptualize and direct the video. Also, he/she should be the person entering the contest as the applicant on the submission form and be submitting one video on behalf of the group in the application. (If the applicant is declared a winner, he/she is most welcome to share the cash award with the team members!)

Creating Good Videos to publicize your research project using Social Media

These 8 tips were prepared by award winning film producer John Mounier, Associate Director of Visual Communications at UC Davis Strategic Communications.

- 1. What are you trying to say? Take ten minutes, and write out the main point of your video. Is it about a person? A class? Think about the core of the story you're trying to tell and give it some words.
- 2. Who will be the voice of your video? Is the story told by you? Or someone you're planning to interview?
- 3. Keep the message of the video simple. In video, people often try and cram multiple stories/messages into one video. The medium works best when it hits an emotional level. What does the story mean to you? Your subject?
- 4. Shoot some good b-roll. This mean, shots you can use to edit over who is speaking. So, if someone is describing their favorite spot on campus, what shots could you get to cover up some of the words?
- 5. Shoot wide, medium and close-up shots, with a tripod, if possible.
- 6. No waterhosing! Meaning, don't shoot everything from one standing position. Move around the room. Get close to things. Move the camera close to things.
- 7. Try and find a quiet-ish place to shoot. Keep in mind, other people talking, music playing in the background, televisions and telephones all make distracting sounds that take viewers out of your story. Pull your person (or yourself) someplace quiet and shoot your interview there.
- 8. Have fun!

The 39th Year of the NPFDA Scholarship

The National Poultry and Food Distributors Association Scholarship Foundation has given almost \$240,000.00 to rising leaders in the 39 years it has been operating. Every year since 1979, NPFDA has awarded a select group of deserving students with a scholarship to help them complete their poultry or agriculture related degrees.

In the Past:

The NPFDA scholarship began when its leadership saw the need for outstanding "People Resources" in the agricultural industry. In 1986, the William Manson

Family Memorial Scholarship and the Alfred Schwartz Memorial Scholarship Awards were established. In 1997, NPFDA named a third scholarship award the Albin S. Johnson Memorial Scholarship Award.

The yearly award has increased to \$4000 per student and the number of students to be awarded has increased to 5 (\$20,000 total in awards). The NPFDA scholarship committee chooses five exceptional students each year. Two students will be chosen from NPFDA Member Companies (employees or children of employees

The funds for the 2018-2019 scholarships come from private cash donations and donations to NPFDA's annual silent auction. The silent auction is held each January during the Annual Convention in Atlanta at the Awards reception.

Information for Current Students:

Each applicant must:

- Be a college junior or senior during the upcoming school year
- Be enrolled as a full-time student
- Be pursuing a poultry or related agricultural degree, i.e. Agricultural Business, Poultry Science, Food Science, Animal Science, Food Marketing, Ag. Econ, and other related business and agricultural degrees.
- Provide his or her sealed official transcript. Must be the official Transcript and stamped for authentication.
- Provide a letter of recommendation from his or her Dean, Department Head, and/or advisor.
- Complete the application
- Provide a one-page letter describing his or her goals and aspirations

All applications and documents are due by 5/31/18. Only official transcripts will be considered after 5/31/18 due to the short timeframe between the end of the semester and the deadline.

In late spring, the scholarship committee will review all applicants. The scholarship winners are chosen based on their aspirations, extra-curricular activities, as well as their academic progress. Winners will be contacted via phone call in July. Everyone else will receive an email.

Scholarship

One \$2,000.00 scholarship will be offered to a student selected from applicants from Auburn University, Louisiana State University, Mississippi State University, North Carolina State University, and University of California, Davis.

If the scholarship committee feels no student fulfills the requirements, scholarship may not be given.

Awards

The US SWEET POTATO COUNCIL Scholarship will be paid to the university's Financial Aid Office of the recipient's university. Upon receiving the payment, we will ask the Financial Aid Officer to verify registration of the Scholarship awardee.

Scholarship Program Objectives

The purpose of the program is to develop and design the logo and associated style guide for the US SWEET POTATO COUNCIL.

The US SWEET POTATO COUNCIL is an advocate for the economic well-being of the US Sweet Potato producer. The sweet potato producers and the entire US sweet potato industry benefit directly and indirectly from the activities of the Council that supports them in implementing reasonably priced promotion activities, monitoring federal issue affecting the growers' ability to produce efficiently, advocating key congressional representatives and staff on federal issues important to growers, and providing a forum for bringing together, on a national level, growers and issues of diverse regions.

- 1. The Council seeks to have a unique logo, unlike any of the state associations, commissions or councils.
- 2. Designs should be presented in single color, two-color and full color versions with the palettes and typography identified accordingly.
- 3. The design needs to be applicable across various applications print, electronic, merchandise, etc.
- 4. Selected design becomes the property of the US Sweet Potato Council however, may be used in student/professional portfolio. A letter of support and authorization will be provided by the Council.

Eligibility Requirements

Age, gender, race, religion, national origin or financial needs are not conditions of eligibility for the award.

Application procedures for students

- 1. All applications require design submission as noted above.
- 2. Write a Style Guide for logo use 1-color, 2-color and full color use of the logo in various applications.
- 3. Write a statement of your design rationale.
- 4. Provide a letter of recommendation from the department head and/or a faculty member.
- 5. The US SWEET POTATO COUNCIL office must receive all applications by July 13, 2018.

Special Notes

- 1. If an awardee withdraws from school, the unused balance of the award must be returned to the US SWEET POTATO COUNCIL.
- 2. Scholarship recipient is asked, if possible, to attend the US SWEET POTATO COUNCIL Convention.

Selection Process

- 1. A US SWEET POTATO COUNCIL scholarship will be awarded to a student attending one of the listed universities Auburn University, Louisiana State University, Mississippi State University, North Carolina State University and University of California.
- 2. The award of these Scholarships will be based on the following:
 - a) Design
 - b) Style Guide
 - c) Statement your rationale for the design submitted.
 - d) Financial needs will not be a consideration for this award.
- 3. The Scholarship Committee will select the recipient(s).

Selection Submissions:

- a) Design 60%
- b) Clarity of expression, spelling and grammar 20%
- c) Persuasiveness 10%
- d) Originality of thought 10%

The evaluation will be according to the personal opinion of the council's panel of judges.

Notification

The awarded applicant and the University will be notified of the recipient.

A written acceptance from the successful recipient must be sent to the US SWEET POTATO COUNCIL office before the scholarship funds will be released for use by the recipient.

The DNMC Dairy Summit is an industry gathering of dairy producers and dairy industry professionals that meet annually for a weekend of fun and education. The 11th annual renewal of this event will be held October 11-14 in Vail, Colorado at the Arrabelle Hotel.

DNMC is pleased to announce the 4th edition of the Dairy Summit Student Essay Contest. The winner of this contest will be awarded \$750, travel costs to the meeting and participation in the recreational events. The student will be asked to present their winning essay to the conference attendees. The faculty member that assists with the winning student submission will also receive registration to the event, hotel accommodations, and travel costs.

There will be two runners-up recognized at the meeting. These two individuals will receive a \$200 cash award and will be required to send a poster of their winning essay. The poster should be formatted as if for a scientific meeting and submitted in the typical poster size. All essays accepted for submission will be included in a bound booklet to be provided to conference attendees. This compilation of essays will be a way for contestants to present themselves to as many as 20 western US dairy producers and 13 sponsoring companies for potential future employment opportunities.

The objective of the essay is to clearly define a problem or issue in today's dairy industry and details of how the student's educational plans or career plans may be able to offer solutions to solve the problem or address the issue. The essay is limited to a two-page maximum and should not be a resume or personal story. The submissions will be scored on a rubric that focusses on the clear statement of a problem/issue and how the student plans to generate potential solutions. Judges will be industry professionals who are familiar with emerging trends and topics. Writing skills and overall professionalism of the essay are included in the rubric.

This contest is open to college juniors, seniors and master's degree candidates. A student is defined as being enrolled in a university during the 2018 academic year. Student's designated to graduate during the 2018 academic year will be considered.

Please send only a PDF version of the essay. Be sure to include all contact information for the student in the PDF document, not just the email message used for delivery.
