VISITORS

Chuck and Pam Stiers visited Davis this summer for a few days on their vacation in the U. S. from the Congo. Chuck hopes to take a Master's in International Agricultural Development starting in January, 1970. They will have been in the Congo about three years and had to return for this last six months to train their replacements. They have been teaching at Congo Polytechnic Institute, a Methodist outpost in the Western Congo. Chuck has been teaching agriculture (the school boasts 80 head of beef cattle, 500 chickens, 30 rabbits and 10 head of dairy cattle) and Pam has been teaching in Teacher Training High School. Chuck and Pam have become fluent in French and Chuck's agricultural/trade demonstrations must be in Swahili. An article, with pigtures, sent by Chuck is in the office. Their address is BP 522, Lubumbashi, Congo, Africa; and any news of friends and home is welcome.

At the request of Jim Elings, Dr. James Stouffer of Cornell University visited our Department to demonstrate his newly developed ultrasonic devide, the AN/SCAN, on several of our animals. This instrument appears to have the potential of determining what is under the hide of live animals -- fat thickness and muscle depth in beef cattle, sheep and hogs. It also offers considerable potential in the determination of pregnancy and multiple birth in sheep, the detection of udder abnormalities in milk cows and diseased testicles in breeding bulls.

DEPARTMENTAL ACTIVITIES

Bill Weir, Jim Morris and Jim Clawson attended the National Conference on Forage Quality Evaluation and Utilization at Lincoln, Nebraska. Dr. Weir presented a paper on "Basis for use of Simplified Techniques to Evaluate Alfalfa for Hay and Brush for Browse in California." A copy of the conference proceedings is in the Department Library.

Dr. Floyd Carroll will offer a one unit course, Elementry Horsemanship, in the Fall quarter as A.S. 38. In view of the horses enlarging role as a pleasure animal, the course should be a suitable elective for students with a variety of interests other than agriculture.

The annual Animal Industry Conference sponsored by the California Grain and Feed Association and the University of California will be held at the Del Webb Town House in Fresno, Monday, November 17. The format of this conference will be different than for the last several years. The morning session will be a general meeting offering subjects pertinent to all livestock and poultry interests. The audience will break up into groups during the afternoon for sessions aimed specifically at poultry, dairy and meat animals.

The 20th Annual Meeting of the American Physiological Society was held on the Davis campus during the last week in August. Dr. Cole served as Chairman of the local steering committee on organization and administration. The meeting was very successful in that 503 scientific papers were presented and 1,064 members and guests attended. The conference climaxed with a Symposium on Energy Metabolism and Its Regulation in honor of Professor Kleiber of the Department of Animal Science.

Rube Albaugh was a speaker at annual field day of Ranch Services, Inc., Klamath Falls, Oregon, and discussed "The Meat-Type Bull".

The Second Annual Meeting of the Society for the Study of Reproduction was held on the Davis campus September 8, 9, 10. Approximately 400 delegates from the United States and several foreign countries attended the three day session. Symposia and research papers dealing with the various aspects of reproduction in many species were well attended. The local committee for this meeting was composed of P. T. Cupps, Animal Science, Chairman; R. D. Barnes, Martin Drost, J. W. Kendrick and George Stabenfeldt of the School of Veterinary Medicine; F. W. Lorenz, Department of Animal Physiology; Stanley Meizel, of the Medical School, and F. X. Ogasawara of Poultry Husbandry.
